

Sacred Koyasan A Pilgrimage To The Mountain Temple Of Saint Kobo Daishi And The Great Sun Buddha

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A more challenging pilgrimage trail is the Kohechi Trail, part of the Kumano Kodo trail network, which connects Koyasan to the sacred shrines of Kumano. Be aware that it is a long and remote mountainous route that takes nearly a week to hike and requires proper planning and equipment to undertake.

Along with Koyasan, Mount Yoshino in Nara prefecture is one of three sites of the UNESCO listed Sacred Sites and Pilgrimage Routes in the Kii Mountain Range. From Osaka Abenobashi station to Yoshino is just under two hours on the Osaka-Kintetsu line.

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In July 2004 (Heisei 16), these sacred sites and pilgrimage routes were registered as a World Heritage Site called "Sacred Sites and Pilgrimage Routes in the Kii Mountain Range." The territories under this designation include the Koya Sankei-michi and Choishi-michi Routes, Kongobu-ji Temple precincts (6 regions), as well as 12 buildings in ...

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The ancient pilgrimage routes connecting these sacred sites in the mountains are collectively called the Kumano Kodo. The network of trails is one of only two UNESCO World Heritage-registered pilgrimage routes in the world. The main five routes of the Kumano Kodo are the Nakahechi, Kohechi, Iseji, Omine Okugakemichi and Koyasan Choishimichi ...

The Danjo Garan Sacred Temple Complex marks the center point of Koyasan settlement itself, and stands on the spot where ascetic study first commenced at this site. The Great Tower (Konpo Daito) is quintessential Japanese traditional architecture, and believed to be the first instance of a two-storied, square pagoda in Japan.
